



Beef Tips by Tom Biery

I first read fish food recipes that included beef heart and liver about 20 years ago. Several years ago I decided to try preparing my own fish food. At first I wasn't sure were to even purchase beef heart, of course, liver was available at the market. So I decided to go to the supermarket and actually look for beef heart. Guess what, no beef heart, but some veal heart was found. My first experiences were to say the least a bloody mess. Generally beef heart was not available at the supermarket and when it was the trouble of grinding it with food processors, graters, and other gizmos around the kitchen made it hardly seem worth it. But I continued to try preparing my own fish food.

So you say were's the beef tips. Let me introduce you to the neighborhood butcher, you know that "mom and pop" shop around the corner. The kind of place that calls you up a few weeks before Thanksgiving and Christmas and asks if you are going to order fresh turkey and ham again this year. Oh yeah, so order a few beef hearts from them.

When I pickup the beef hearts, I kindly ask if after I trim them I may bring them back to be ground. No problem says the butcher. The butcher has a motorized grinder that is always sparkling clean and has different size plates. I ask the butcher to use the plate with 1/8" size holes. This size provides the consistency that is easily swallowed by fish approximately 3" and larger. Additionally the butcher can grind liver, shrimp, fish and what ever else your recipe calls for.

A few minutes later I am on my way home to try some new recipe. Only this time without the bloody mess. The butcher never minds, he thinks my fish must be piranhas. The cost of the ground beef heart is about \$3 to \$5 per pound. I am happy that it is fresh and high quality.

One last tip. Trim the beef hearts yourself. A friend of mine once ordered 15 lbs! of beef heart trimmed and ground. The result was too fatty. Beef heart has a lot of fat on the outside and a butchers idea of trimmed does not mix well with water.

How To ... Keep Your Aquarium Clean

When I was a kid (back in the dark ages before siphon-operated gravel cleaners) the task of cleaning my aquarium was a chore to be avoided. It was a lot of work, and took me away from watching television or playing outside. Cleaning an aquarium today is a different story.

Today aquarists have it easy. Cleaning an aquarium used to involve catching fish, dismantling the aquarium, cleaning the aquarium and all parts, reassembling, filling with fresh water (dechlorinated) and re-acclimating the fish to their clean home. What a mess, to say nothing of the stress that the fish had to endure. Even a 10 gallon could take more than an hour! With today's equipment, and some knowledge picked up along the way, a 10 gallon is no more than a 20 minute job.

The one piece of equipment that I think has done the most for the aquarium hobby in the last ten years (and which no aquarist should be without) is the siphon-operated gravel cleaner. It is really nothing more than a siphon tube connected to a larger diameter tube which slows down the water flow enough to tumble the gravel. As simple as it is, I am surprised that no one thought of it years ago. This device has made cleaning an aquarium an easy task.

Before I get into the How To, I would like to go over the Why. When an aquarium is first set up and fish are added everything is clean, but that soon changes. Fish wastes begin to build up in the water, algae begins to grow (using the wastes as fertilizer) and the chemistry of the water begins to change. If the process is allowed to continue for several months, the water can change quite drastically. Dissolved organic compounds give the water a yellowish color, the pH becomes acidic, minerals build up as water evaporates and algae grows rampant on the gravel, glass and decorations.

Now we get to an important point. Conditions in most aquaria (10 gallons or larger) change rather gradually allowing most fish to

adjust. If you allow conditions to become very bad and then do a major cleaning like the one described above the fish (which are now accustomed to bad water) will be under a lot of stress from the rapid change and will be more susceptible to disease. For this reason it is much better to do more frequent, smaller cleanings. Try to get on a schedule of every two weeks. [An interesting side note: in my experience the larger the aquarium, the cleaner it stays wastes don't build up as quickly and desktop aquariums are nearly impossible to keep clean.]

To do regular aquarium maintenance you will need:

- A bucket
- A gravel cleaner
- & Towels
- An algae scrubber
- Water conditioner

The first thing to do is check the temperature of the aquarium so you will know what temperature to mix the fresh water. Then turn off and remove the hood and unplug the heater (heaters that come on while out of water usually crack the glass tube). Be careful not to change the setting on the heater.

Start a siphon with the gravel cleaner. There are several ways of doing this. For those who are squeamish about sucking on a hose that has been in fish water, the easiest way is to begin by placing the large tube in the aquarium. Make sure that it is completely submerged, then slowly submerge the rest of the hose until you get to the end. The entire hose should now be filled with water. Place your thumb over the end, lift it out of the water, place it into a bucket on the floor and remove your thumb.

By the way, your bucket should be large enough to hold all of the water that you plan on changing (about 25-35% of the aquarium water). You can use several small buckets or make several trips, but it makes the process more difficult and you may forget to watch and overflow a bucket.

Push the gravel cleaning tube down into the gravel as far as you can, then lift it slowly. The gravel will tumble around in the tube and fall out while the dirt is swept away up the tube and into the bucket. For best results, hold the tube vertical. If you have fine gravel, you may need to pinch the siphon tube a little to slow down the flow and release the gravel as you lift the tube. Push the tube down in another spot and repeat. Work back and forth and around the decorations until you have removed 25-35% of the water, then stop

siphoning. You should have plenty of time to clean the whole bottom. If not, you need a gravel cleaner with a smaller diameter tubing.

Dump out the old water (or use it to water house plants - it is excellent fertilizer) and fill the bucket with fresh water at the same temperature. Be sure to use a water conditioner to remove chlorine, chloramine and other toxins from the tap water before you put it into the aquarium. It is a good idea to use a water conditioner even if you are using well water, it still may contain contaminants.

Before refilling the aquarium, scrub the algae from the glass, smooth out the gravel and straighten any decorations that were disturbed. If you want to clean inside the filter tubes, brushes are available but, as they say, a little algae never hurt anyone. When done cleaning, fill the aquarium to the trim.

Change any filters that need it and replace the carbon with fresh. Carbon is highly porous and traps dirt and impurities but the pores clog quickly and the carbon becomes ineffective after two weeks use. It doesn't take a lot of carbon to do the job (2 tablespoons of one brand has over 3 acres of surface area) but you should replace it regularly. The same guidelines


apply to ammonia removing resins.

Finally, plug the heater back in, replace the hood and wipe down the outside with a towel. Be sure to check the temperature several times in the next day or so to be sure the heater is still set correctly.

Now, that wasn't so hard, was it? In fact, it's so easy that you can do this every 2-3 weeks, which will keep your aquarium as clean and healthy as it can be. If you are like I was when I started out, you will get much more satisfaction from your fish using this method.
