## SPAWNING GEOPHAGUS JURUPARI

Geophagus jurupari, sometimes known as the "Demon Fish," is found in parts of Brazil and the Guianas. The fish reportedly grows to approximately 25 cm. (ten inches) in the wild, but very seldom do we see specimens larger than 15cm. (six inches) in captivity. Jurupari has the reputation of being one of the most peaceful cichlid species. Some other Geophagus are quarrelsome and even predatory, for example, Geophagus Brasiliensis, which I've learned not to trust with smaller fishes.

I became interested in Jurupari about two years ago, in my transition from African Cichlids to Neotropicals. The fish were often seen at two inches in pet shops, but were never abundant at the time and rarely in good shape. I found four Jurupari in two different shops and placed them in a fifty-five gallon community tank. The fish were approximately 7.5 cm. (three inches) long and exhibited no sexual dimorphism.

In April, 1982, while visiting Ginny and Charlie Eckstein, I observed their Jurupari, which had spawned just prior to my arrival. The pair were approximately 12.5 cm. (five inches) in length and (again) sexually indistinguishable. An interesting observation at the time, which later proved inconclusive, was that the male had shorter pelvic fins than the female; the dorsal fins were unremarkable in both the male and female. Ginny and I theorized that one of the problems with spawning Jurupari is that the male, with his normally longer fins in most cichlid species, had been conditioned for spawning, rather than the female, which in Ginny's pair, had the longer fins, at least with regard to the pelvic fins.


Upon returning home, I set up my Jurupari, now about 12.5 cm. (five inches), for spawning, removing all but a pair of Discus from the fifth-five gallon tank. I bought a large plastic Amazon Sword and laid a piece of slate behind the plastic plant, duplicating Ginny's set up, except that she used a hexagon tank.

Some time passed before I noticed that two of the Jurupari spent considerable time behind the plant over the slate which was partially sheltered by the leaves. I turned the thermometer up, raising the temperature from 82 degrees F., and removed the other At about eleven c'clock on an August evening, the two Jurupari. pair spawned. I took many, many pictures of the fearing at first that the fish might be distracted, sequence, ignored me and proceeded to lay, in typical cichlid fashion, approximately 120 eggs in an hour or so. The female's breeding tube was blunt while the male's tube was pointed. No other sexual differences were noted, though each fish showed a remarkable capacity for color changes through-out the spawning, not unlike many cichlids.

On the following evening, the female, with the male at her side, picked up the clutch of eggs and began a seven day oral incubation period, releasing her fry intermittently from the eighth day forward. About ten days later, I moved the female and her fry to a ten gallon tank.

Primarily because the male had become somewhat aggressive towards his mate. On a diet of Artemia Revolution, a beef heart/agar mixture, and powdered fry foods, the young Jurupari grew to about an inch in about two and a half months.

With reference to my earlier remarks regarding longer pelvic fins on Ginny Eckstein's female Jurupari, my male's fins, all of them were noticeably longer, so our theory on sexing and conditioning Jurupari didn't survive. I will state that in adult Jurupari (I've now spawned two pairs), the females are heavier bodied, particularly in the abdominal region, and are the aggressors when in breeding condition.

## SPAWNING THE CHOCOLATE CICHLID

When I first saw a Chocolate Cichlid about two years ago in a local shop, I was anything but impressed, since the single specimen was in a very large tank and was being harassed by larger and more aggressive cichlids and catfish. It was sometime later when I again saw the fish at Ginny and Charlie Eckstein's Aquarium, Long Island, New York.

When my wife, who prefers Poodles to fish, said that she thought the fish was pretty, I was convinced then and there that I had to have some. Before returning home, we had "Jenifer," a twelve inch female Chocolate Cichlid, given to Barbara Edmondson by Ginny Eckstein, as a pet. With the "pet" category was the message, "no shows, no breeding," so I set out to find some smaller Chocolates.

The Chocolate Cichlid is Cichlasoma coryphaenoides, according to Paul Loiselle's's excellent studies, "The Cichlasoma Species of South America: Part 1" in the December, 1980 FAMA, and is found in the Amazon Basin. According to Sterba, the fish grows to approximately 22cm. (1)

Much controversy has surrounded the correct scientific name of the Chocolate Cichlid, also known as C. hellabruni, C. crassa, and C. temporale. As if there wasn't enough confusion, an article in TFH magazine called the fish "The Emerald Cichlid," (2) referring apparently to the velvety green of some specimens uppersides; the undersided and flanks are a beautiful wine-red, especially so in breeding dress.

Jim Langhammer, Curator of the Belle Isle Aquarium, Detroit, Michigan, and a Technical Editor of Buntbarsche Bulletin (Journal of the American Cichlid Association), says that "almost without exception, illustrations in all hobby publications for Cichlasoma coryphaenoides, Cichlasoma crassa and Cichlasoma hellabruni, are actually illustrations of the same species at different ages. (3) He goes on to say that one to four inch illustrations are usually labeled C. coryphaenoides, four to six inch sub-adults called C. crassa, and fully adult fish labeled C.hellabruni. (4)

He concludes that C. coryphaenoides is "the first and hopefully the last name...." (5)

I found six small Chocolates at Mother Nature's in Levittown, New York in October, 1981 and placed them in a forty gallon tank with several other species of cichlids and assorted catfish. The chocolates were very shy and didn't compete very well for food, so I soon moved them into a twenty gallon tank and, still later, into a fifty-five with Keyholes and other less aggressive species.

In the mean time, I bought a "mated pair" of Chocolate Cichlids from a local hobbyist and traded for a four inch female, which had been laying eggs by herself in a local shop. The "matched pair", a four and a half inch male and his slightly smaller female fought incessantly and were separated.

I might mention that I had tried to buy a pair from Ginny Eckstein, but she refused because they were egg eaters and she was caused to hatch each spawn artificially, on each of two pairs, if I remember correctly.

I finally got a spawn from the odd female and the male from the pair, but discovered the spawn late and all but a few of the eggs had fungused. I moved the new "pair" from a thirty gallon tank into a fifty-five gallon giving them a large flower pot and several rocks on which to spawn. The fish spawned several times in their new tank, but fought and refused to guard the spawns.

Since I also had a breeding pair of Green Severum in the fifty-five, I had divided the tank, because of very limited tank space. I decided to unload some other species (Jurupari and Aequidens mariae, among others) so as to return the Chocolate Cichlids to a now empty thirty gallon tank.

My efforts were soon rewarded, with a spawn of approximately one hundred or so eggs. I wound up with approximately sixty half inch fry about a month later. The loss of fry I attributed to their inability to find food, which consisted of crushed flakes and pellets and Kordon's Baby-Fry Diet. Subsequent spawns by that pair and other pairs from my six small chocolates, now four to five inches, have had larger spawns and greater survival rates.

Infusoria and Artemia Revolution are now my starter foods for just about all of my recent spawns, and I would recommend same to anyone who repeatedly has a significant loss of fry. Though pairs of C. coryphaenoides soon settle down and exhibit their beautiful colors, with or without fry, additional members of the species are not allowed to share the same tank(s) in peace.

I placed a smaller pair in a 110 gallon tank, which "Jenifer" calls home, and was lucky to get them out before she could do very much damage. The Chocolate Cichlid, C. coryphaenoides, is more available now than before, and is well worth any hobbyist's time and attention.

Jim Hajdics announced that a BAP meeting will be held in April-the exact date is to be announced.


The board voted to have FAAS awards framed and the presented to members.
