



The Librarian asked for an OK on \$30 expense for storage for the library and was allocated the funds.


Whether or not to have a picnic this summer was discussed briefly.



OFF THE RECORD: BOWL SHOW TIPS AND GUIDELINES

If you think the fish looks good and healthy, the judges will probably agree...A clean bowl with clean water will help...Remove old stickers from previous shows, (the night of the show is best as time seems to cement them on more firmly).. Use a container big enough for your fish. A drum bowl is ideal for most—but go to a 2 1/2 gallon or a 5 gallon if you are showing a big fish... A two-flat-sided container is the conventional drum bowl in an appropiate size, preferbly of glass...



BREEDING REPORTS

RAINBOW CICHLID

No stranger to the Rainbow Cichlid, I had kept them off and on over the past five years. They had always been kept in a community situation with other peaceful cichlid species. (Aequidens, etc). If they ever spawned, I never knew it.

A monotypic genus, Herotilapia Multispinossa constitutes the single valid species in the genus.

I picked up a bag on one-inch Rainbows at the PVAS Fall Auction in October 1982. Of the seven young adults, only two were females. They were kept in a small tank until they were nearly three inches in length whereby I moved them to a fifty-five community tank with a trio of Aequidens maroni and six small Geophagus jurapari.

The Rainbows lived up to their name by the time they reached three in hes in length/ Gold, soft brown, black and an iridescent blue coloration of the head of H. spinossa made my acquisition well worth while.

In March of this year, the larger tric were moved to a twenty gallon tank. Within a few days I had to retrieve one of the females. Odd gal out, she was really battered, split fins and all. She was cowering between the side glass and a large Jungle Hatchery Dirt Magnet. I returned the battered female to the community tank.

The male cleared all the sand from beneath the spawning rock which was propped against another large piece of quartz. This created a "cave" giving easy access to both prospective parents.

In a few days the female began cleaning the spawning rock. Within a week she was fanning a humungous clump of eggs-- at least 200 of them. Both parents moved the babies to the bare glass under the spawning rock once the wiggler stage was reached.

The last of my Kordon Fry Diet kept the fry alive until the baby Rainbows could handle pulverized flake food. At about a half-inch they could eat small black worms and once a week were able to hitch a ride on adult brine shrimp. It took two or three of the fry to subdue an adult brine shrimp.

Some of the fry are gluttons and always seem to get more than their share of food. About twenty of these chow hounds reached an inch and a quarter in only sixty days. Their siblings are lucky to be a half to three-quarters of an inch in the same time.

Needing the twenty gallon tank for another spawning attempt, Rainbow parents and 148 fry have been transferred to another tank and I expect to unload the entire clan in the immediate future.

Any club member wishing to try their hand with this peaceful Central American cichlid has only to give me a call.

ANGELFISH

Pterophyllum scalare is popularly known as the Angelfish" of the "Queen of the Cichlids." Pterophyllum means winged leaf, and scalare means ladder-like, referring to the back edge of the long fins.

The original Angelfish was described in 1823 by Lichtenstein. Its first record in the aquarium hobby goes back to 1911 when it was imported into Germany. The first Angelfish to reach the United States came from Germany in 1915.

The Angelfish is a South American Cichlid, native to the Amazon River. It grows to five to six inches at maturity.

I kept my large male and female in a 55-gallon community tank along with various types of Danios, Tetras, Corydoras and other Pterophyllum scalare.

The mature adult Angelfish were fed Tetra Min Staple Food; also some live black worms and frozen Brine Shrimp. I did this to condition the mature adults for breeding by giving them a good varies diet..

Sexing mature adults remains difficult, but you can make a shrewd guess. I noticed that the body of the male is much larger than the female. It is also much thicker from the "feelers" to the base of the beginning of the anal fin. The female is much thinner than the male except when she is full of eggs. She looks fuller in this area, as if a small bean had been swallowed.

The adults were kept in a PH of 6.8 and temperature of 78 degrees F. They were given a 10 percent water change every seven days from the beginning of January until the day of spawning.

I didn't see the actual spawning of the pair, but I saw the eggs attached to a large piece of slate that was in the corner of the aquarium.

I placed the slate in a 2 1/2 gallon fish bowl filled with the water from the aquarium where the spawning had taken place. I put a few drops of Metholane Blue in the bowl and an air stone with a very light aeration to help stop the fungus from growing on the eggs.

After the eggs hatched and the fry began to swim freely. I moved them to a bare 55-gallon aquarium. I began feeding them live baby Brine Shrimp that were raised in a gallon jug of instant ocean salt water. I found it gives a better hatch of the shrimp. I continued feeding the fry this way for the next four weeks. They began to take the shape of the Pterophyllum scalare about the third week.

In the fifth week, I began feeding the fry black worms chopped in halves and thirds. In the sixth week, I served the black worms whole.






