OFF THE RECORD: BOWL SHOW TIPS AND GUIDELINES

If you think the fish looks good and healthy, the judges will probably agree...A clean bowl with clean water will help...Remove old stickers from previous shows, (the night of the show is best as time seems to cement them on more firmly).. Use a container big enough for your fish. A drum bowl is ideal for most—but go to a 2 1/2 gallon or a 5 gallon if you are showing a big fish... A two-flat-sided container is the conventional drum bowl in an appropriate size, preferbly of glass...

Notice to Tropical Fish Owners

Tropical fish owners whose water supply is furnished by the Fairfax County Water Authority may find the declorinating process which they have been using when they change or add water to their fish tanks may not remove all of the chorine in the water because of modifications in the water purification process which have been made to comply with Federal drinking water standards.

This new treatment process reduces the amount of free chlorine in the water, but makes the resulting combined chlorine more difficult to neutralize with normal dosages of a dechlorination agent.

It is recommended that owners increase the dechlorination agent dosages several times the conventional amount, and use a chlorine test kit (available from swimming pool supply houses) to determine when the water is free of chlorine. Since levels of chlorine in the water supply fluctuate during the year, owners should make sure they have neutralized all chlorine each time they clean or add water to aquariums before fish are returned to the tanks.

EDITORS NOTE:

This notice was mailed by Fairfax County to local pet stores and is fair warning that chlorine levels MAY change drastically..

If you don't have a fancy chlorine test kit, simply let your nose be the judge before and during water changes.

QUESTIONS THEY NEVER ASK AXLEROD

QUESTION: Can an Arowana and a Neon Tetra be Successfully
crossbred?-- Pat Mussatto

ANSWER: Yes, Pat, of course, they're both egglayers, aren't they? There are however certain tricks to the successful crossbreeding. The first trick and sometimes the hardest, is to obtain a mated pair. It's best to select a plump female arowana, and several male neons and let the female make her choice. After a short period of time you will notice that the fish are readying themselves for spawning. The number of male neons will rapidly diminish. (Obviously, the rejected suitors are flinging themselves from the tank in anguish over not being chosen). At the same time the female arowana will start to "plump out", obviously filling with eggs in joyous anticipation of the upcoming spawn. NOTE: Sometimes it will be necessary to try several hundred males before the elusive combination is found.

Now to set up your breeding tank. A 97.36 gallon extra long is recommended. Place 81.4 gallons of neutral water or tap water (or an infusoria culture) in the tank along with a double layer of amber eye marbles. These serve a double function. Rather than allowing the eggs to fall through and be protected by the marbles, the amber cats eyes look exactly like the "Neowana" eggs. In addition. after the spawn, when the male neon is hungrily looking for the eggs, he will invariably inadvertantly eat a marble thereby severly limiting his searching from that point on. It is also highly recommended that two large bunches of plants be placed at opposite ends of the tank. This is to give the arowana a place to hide during the extremely hard driving by the male. If you don't mind a few ripped fins and missing scales, this is unnecessary.

Now remove the spawner and spawnee. Place them in separate 5 gallon tanks to recover. (Her from the tremendous battering from the male, and him from a very swelled head).

Now darken the spawning tank and wait 17 days, 3 hours, 42 minutes and 4 seconds and check the tank. If all has gone well, approximately 1/4 of the eggs will have hatched. If not, you will at least have extra marbles for your next attempt.

You can, upon free swimming, start your fry out on a diet of infusoria and 1/2-inch cubes of beef heart. You will undoubtably notice a minor variation in size, as some of the newly hatched fry will be approximately 1/8-inch long and transparent while the balance will be approximately 4 inches long.

As these fish grow to maturity, you will find that you have two distinct types of fish. One is a yard long neon that looks best (and is happiest) in schools of 30 or more, and the other is a 3/4-inch long arowana that eats a dozen adult goldfish a day.
